Hidden Gems at Fiske Library: The Fragile/Rare Bookcase

Next to the entrance of the Fiske Library is the glass bookcase which houses Fiske's fragile and rare books. On top of the case is the computer that volunteers use to scan the barcodes of the books that patrons have used and where patrons scan their drivers' license to give us a count of how many people have visited the library.

For many years, the only way to know what books were in the case was to look through the "Rare Book Collection in Display Case" printed list found at the opposite end the glass case from the computer, since most of the books were not listed online. Sadly, that list was not accurate, and the books had not been organized in a way that they could be found easily.

For the past two months, the Wednesday volunteers have been assessing which of the fragile and rare books had been catalogued, which ones needed to be added to Fiske's online catalog in World Cat, and whether there were items that were rare archival materials. Once the initial analysis was done, they then did the work to catalog the books that could be cataloged, made sure they had readable shelf labels, returned them to the bookcase, and created a list of which books were on which shelf of the bookcase so that they could be found easily.

Along with finding a wealth of historical books, a couple of rare manuscripts were discovered. One is an attorney's handwritten Probate Accounts ledger from Putnam Co., Illinois. The accounts cover years 1833 to 1837. A former volunteer has created an index of the names of the people listed in the ledger that is a valuable resource for researchers which we hope to add to the Fiske website in the future.

Another rare manuscript is a handwritten record in an 1860's composition notebook of the Baptisms & Confirmations, Marriages & Funerals between 1811 and 1857 from the Parish record of Christ Church in Manlius, Onondaga Co. New York. A separate index was also created. Even though there is a digital copy of the records in the Internet Archive, this is a great resource for the library.

So, the next time you visit the Fiske Library, take a moment to scan the rare and wonderful books now sitting in an organized manner in the glass bookcase. You can also check out the list of books in the "Rare Book Collection in Display Case" document. To give you a preview of what is in the glass display case a selection of book titles is listed below.
