

Fiske Library Virtual Classes – A Great Resource

Looking back on our 2024-2025 series of classes, I'm impressed with how we explored things "outside the box," as well as received the latest expertise in familiar topics. For example, we learned from Joseph Anderson how ancestors are regarded in other cultures, and how generational healing can take place. A most interesting study of a 19th-century Slovak village by Mike Kocsik was preceded the week before by Lisa Alzo's presentation on how to prepare for Eastern European research. And Mary Roddy's class on "Putting your learning to work" gave us wisdom that not only applies to our genealogy classes, but to all educational opportunities. In the last class of the year, Jenny Hansen showed us the requirements for the Accredited Genealogist (AG) Certification (see ICAPGen.org). Whether one becomes a professional genealogist or not, the skills learned in following this path are truly worth pursuing.

Of course, Artificial Intelligence was big news this year for genealogy. In addition to Sara Cochran's class "Meet Your New Research Assistant," several of our speakers demonstrated AI in gathering information from non-indexed databases.
