

Since the two principal activities of Fiske Foundation are to build a family history library and teach people how to use it, we cannot over emphasize the expansion of our collection. Our library is planned, first in the purchase of the individual volumes, then in the copying of original records which have not found their way into print. It is this planning that will continue to make the library the genealogist's home.

Lumber has been donated as well as labor, to construct six or eight new book shelves, partly to house the new acquisitions and to allow room for expansion on the shelves presently maintained. Now is the time for you to consider xeroxing copies of your individual records to add to collection. In so doing, you will help the library grow and by depositing copies of your records on our shelves, contact someone who is working on the same ancestral lines.
