Pioneer Burial Park "Davis Cemetery" Oak Harbor, Island County Washington

Copied by Mrs. C. F. Hall July 8, 1967. This cemetery is well cared for. Someone lives in the little house beside the old highway and probably is responsible for the care of the burial place. It is past the Catholic Church and just before reaching the Nazarene Church, a road turns west. At the end of the road is the cemetery. A tall flag pole is in front of it and the cemetery is enclosed by a low cement fence. A concrete Monument proclaims this "Pioneers of 1858." A large monument in the cemetery gives the family names of those buried here and on a tall oak tree a sing "Pioneer Burial Park".
