Fiske Library Fall Classes

Fall is in the air, and the usual Fiske Library classes are being planned to begin in September. The schedule looks interesting and exciting, as you will no doubt agree when you have a look at it. Every effort has been made to bring you things which will be helpful, no matter what your areas of interest. Arthur had prepared a temporary schedule early this spring and discussed it in detail with Mary Peters. His plan was that she should teach part of the classes and he would also do his part. Of course, that is not possible since Arthur has passed away, but Mary, with the help of the Foundation Board, has filled in those dates and lessons with other guest lecturers and items which should be of great interest to all genealogists.

The first advanced class, held on September 11, at 10 a.m. will be an overview of the Fiske Library. This will be useful to everyone, but of particular importance to those who are volunteer librarians, especially since the acquisition of so many new books since last spring. You may call the library (328-2716) to register for this class, or, if you are unable to do that, just come early on Wednesday, Sept. 11. A repeat of this class will be held Saturday, Sept. 14. at 10 a.m. All library volunteers are encouraged to attend one or the other of these sessions.

Beginning Classes

Two beginning genealogy class are being offered one beginning Wednesday September 11 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m - the second beginning Wednesday, October 2nd from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. This 8 week course will include topics such as collecting information from your family, organizing your records, researching at local libraries and archives, using the Family History Center, obtaining information from census records, gathering oral histories, identifying old photographs, researching on the computer, and computerizing you data. The fee is \$40.00.

Remembering Arthur D. Fiske

The last newsletter announced the passing of Arthur on June 14, 1996. The memorial service was held at Denny Park Lutheran church on Saturday, June 29, with Many, many family members and friends in attendance. It was a very nice service, the music being some of Arthur's favorite hymns. The pastor then suggested that persons who wished to make a comment on Arthur's life, could do so. About 20 people spoke of their memories of Arthur-- family members who recalled stories he told them as children, and genealogist friends who talked about his generosity in sharing his knowledge with them.

Following the service the ladies of the church served coffee and delicious goodies downstairs, and friends had an opportunity for further recollections.

The library was opened for members of Arthur's family, some of whom had come quite a distance to observe first-hand his life work. Some of the younger people showed a great interest in the extent of the acquisitions of the library, all basically done by Arthur alone. They were all happy to know that he had left his books to the Foundation, and his library will continue.

New on the Bookshelf

Many books and periodicals have been donated to the Library recently and we wish to thank those who have given so generously. Among these things are some books in a German collection which have been purchased in memory of Ace Fricke. They are: Address Book for Germanic Genealogy, Finding You German Ancestors, Genealogical Guide to Tracing Ancestors in Germany, in Search of Your German Roots, and Pilgrims on the Earth: -a German-Russian Chronicle.

David Williams has given many books and periodicals in the areas of Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, Tennessee, and Yakima Valley.

Claudia Erdman has added several items about Pennsylvania. One of these is the Journal of the Johannas Schwalm Historical Assn., devoted to finding descendants of German soldiers who fought for the British in the American Revolution. There are publications from Lancaster County, as well as clippings from a genealogy newspaper column, "Our Keystone Families," which has been indexed for your use.


