Annual Meeting

Please come to the Library on Sunday afternoon, September 26, 1999, at 3:00 pm for the Annual Report of the Foundation. You will be able to learn more details of the year just completed and look forward to the 1999-2000 year. You will be able to meet some of our benefactors from the past year and express your appreciation to the many volunteers who have contributed hours of work to the Library since June, 1998. No reservations are required. Just spend an hour on a Fall afternoon learning more about your organization.

Library Advisory Committee

A new group of Fiske volunteers will begin work this fall, reviewing Library acquisitions and advising the Foundation Board on how to set priorities for expansion of the collection, maintaining our currency in the key areas of the collection (like New England, New York and the Oregon Country) and how to make optimal use of limited space as the collection grows in size. (We already are almost to 8000 volumes in the Library.) The group also will offer recommendations when problems arise in cataloging new titles, seeking the most useful placement in the collection for retrieval by the patrons.

The committee consists of Mary Peters, director of the Library catalog; Mary Stoebuck, a long time user of the collection; Jan Olson, a volunteer on the Wednesday evening shift and a professional librarian at the Federal Office Building in Seattle; and Gary Zimmerman.

The Board recently affirmed that the Fiske Library will concentrate its efforts on genealogically relevant materials for the areas of North America from the Atlantic coast to the tier of states on the western banks of the Mississippi River, the states in the original Oregon Country, and those overseas lands that supplied the stream of immigrant settlers into each of these North American areas of concern.

While we may choose to accept offered donations concerning other states in the Union, we will be concentrating our purchases and our attention on building up the collection in the above mentioned target areas. We will strive to become the pre-eminent library for New England and Middle Atlantic States research in this part of the world. The continued support and help of all the Fiske Family will be needed to reach this goal.

New Library Hours Are Coming

In an effort to provide more hours of research time to our patrons and to enhance the focus on the Wednesday morning educational seminars, the schedule of Library openings will be changed effective October 1, 1999. You will find that there are several more hours per week to come and use the collection.

Wednesday 12 Noon to 8 pm

Thursday 3:00 pm to 8 pm

Friday open by appt for groups from out of city
Saturday 9:00 am to 3:00 pm

Sunday Second Sunday of month, 1-4 pm

The key changes are to keep the library closed on Wednesday mornings during the weekly seminar and then to open at noon for all research and continue clear through to 8 pm. There will be no need to leave the library for a couple of hours on Wednesday afternoon and then return for the evening. You can work straight through! On Thursday, the Library will be open from 3 pm to 8 pm in an effort to get another day of research for you. On Saturday, the starting time is being moved 1 hour earlier to give you a more effective week-end time to work, and on the days that the Pioneer Association opens their museum to the public (on the second Sunday of the month) the Fiske Collection will be open to you.

President's Message

I recently spent two days at a Collections Management Workshop offered by the Shoreline Historical Museum in north Seattle with support from the King County Landmarks and Heritage Commission. Many of the thirty participants were interested in archival records management. We learned how to keep better records of our collections, how to better preserve the books and files that come to us, how to legally dispose of duplicate and unneeded gifts when they are no longer used in the collection and how to prepare for unanticipated disasters that might damage all or part of the collection.

The Fiske Library resources have been growing at an accelerating rate and we must develop some new approaches to manage the collection in a way that our users can more easily access what is available to them. If you haven't been using our microform collection of fiche and rolls of microfilm, if you haven't been into the CD Rom collection, if you haven't found the depth of our "named" collections, you are missing something in your experience of the Library. In part, that is because we haven't made useful finding aids available to you. There is much work to be done in this regard.

A few weeks ago, we received an extensive collection of research notes and archival material from the family of Brian Llewellyn Young. They represented his 54 years of family research. When Brian Young died in March, 1997, at the age of 80, he left a significant corpus of material that has now come to the library. Mary Stevenson has just completed a summary index to the files, which cover families in New England, Pennsylvania, Virginia and a few in Oregon. Surnames of prominence include Baldwin, Byrd, Huntley, Hutchinson, Martz, Robertson, Robinson, Shay, Stickley, Stockbarger, Stover, and Young.

As we become better organized in the Library, you may want to consider leaving your own notes and research materials to the Library. Future researchers will benefit from the hours you have devoted to your collection and then will be able to build upon it. Leave copies of your summary results for your family, but seriously consider leaving the details in your workbooks to a research library for others to extend that research in the future. All of us will benefit from that consideration.

I would be happy to meet with you to discuss the details of such a gift and how it might be accomplished in a smooth fashion.

Be sure to look at the web site at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City (http://www.familysearch.com), not only for the fast search engines being applied to the IGI and to the Ancestral Files, but also for easy access to the LDS Research Outlines and to the entire catalog of the FHL. You can get right down to the individual roll numbers of microfilm so that you can go to your local Family History Center and quickly order the records you need for your research.

Your Expertise May Be Needed by Someone Else

If you have done a lot of genealogy in a particular region or have cultivated a talent for using a particular kind of record, the Fiske Library can use your skill. You may not want to do public speaking and will avoid the speakers' bureau described elsewhere in this newsletter, but perhaps the more private one-on-one relationship of a mentor to a needy student appeals to you. It has been suggested that we create a roster of volunteeer "experts" who could be called upon by the volunteer staff at the Library when a patron has a particular need for assistance. For example, one person recently volunteered to serve on such a list for questions dealing with Quebec and the records of New France. If a person comes into the library and has a problem finding their French Canadian lineage, we have an offer of expert help from our "consultant list."

If you would like to be included on the first draft of this consultant list, please send a note to Gary at the Library indicating your particular areas of emphasis. Be sure to note that it is the consultant service that you are interested. Gary could also use some people with additional translation skills; he can cover the French, German and Spanish records, but periodically we have to go searching for help on Scandinavian, Russian and Asian languages.
