

President's Message

"Summer is a Comin"

Another programming year at the Fiske Library is drawing to a close and the summer returns with its slightly less hectic pace and the opportunity for more leisurely genealogical research. I hope that each and every one of you will take advantage of that chance! Commit to yourself to spend at least two days this summer in the library. Get acquainted with our new acquisitions and forge ahead on those stubborn lines that you have been following for years!

This is also a time for feedback on how the Library, the educational programs, and the resources available to you are meeting your needs. Are there areas of the collection that would serve you better if they had greater depth? Are there key resources that we've missed in our purchasing program in the Library? Are there topics that should be covered in the seminars? Is there a speaker in the area that you would like to hear at the Fiske Library?

Late summer always involves detailed planning by your Board and committees for the coming season - new trips planned, new courses outlined, new facilities prepared for a new year. You can personally impact that planning with your feedback to any member of the Board or by sending me a message at the Library or an e-mail to gzim@fiske.lib.wa.us and letting me know of your needs.

After months of collaborative planning between the three organizations that share space here in Pioneer Hall, a strategic plan was approved by each of them this Spring to guide improvements in the facility and the operations of each tenant in the building. A steering committee is now addressing how to implement the various elements of the plan. David Brazier and I represent the Fiske Foundation; Shirley Wright and Claire Raaum represent the Pioneer Daughters, and Bob Teague and David Fauver represent the Pioneer Association. Six committees will be working on specific elements of the plan; and each organization will supply chair persons for two of the committees and contribute volunteer members to each of the committees.

One area that Fiske will take leadership in is the "Research" committee, that will assist in getting accurate information for new exhibits in the museum and in supporting projects that will advance the educational activities of each organization. As part of the coming Sesquicentennial of King County, there is a proposal that the three organizations do a study of the namesakes of key roads and streets in the county and prepare materials for public education about them. Genealogical techniques applied to a useful educational project! If you want to help, just give a small hint of your interest and there will be a way for you to get involved! The public education part may also include using websites of the three organizations to further present some of the results of these research activities. Want to help? Let us know.

The Fiske Library will try to maintain its expanded schedule through the Summer, as long as we have enough volunteers willing to cover as people take their individual vacations. Come visit us and make progress on your personal research this summer.

BRIAN YOUNG COLLECTION

Some weeks ago the library received the genealogy papers of Brian Young, a former friend and colleague of Arthur Fiske. Mr. Young had pursued his family history for about 75 years and his widow donated all his papers to the library. These include extensive records of his families, who resided in New England, Virginia, and the Mid-west, as well as the Northwest. The records also cover a period of many, many years and detailed research during this time.

These papers have now been sorted and indexed, and a master list is available. A file has been made which contains the names of the ancestors, and another which simply lists the family names included. Still another file contains the ancestry charts which he made. There are references to the several hundred pages of research that Mr. Young compiled, so it should be quite easy to locate information if you happen to share one of these families. Check with the librarian on duty for the location

of this collection.

SPRING SILVER TEA

At a lovely event held on Sunday, April 30, Debbie Dimitre presented a wonderful program about the life of Ann Morrow Lindbergh, aviatrix, author and poet. Debbie's storytelling delighted the nearly one hundred guests of the Daughters of Washington Pioneers and the Friends of the Fiske Genealogical Foundation. Guests were welcomed by Shirley Wright of the Daughters and Mary Stevenson from Fiske.

Debbie, who was dressed in 1930 clothing, including some neat shoes, told how Anne and Charles mapped previously uncharted flight plans for major airlines so flights could be made safely to Europe, South America, the Orient, and other distant lands. She loved to fly and was truly an adventurous woman, as well as a very talented writer. The audience was so caught up with the story that when it came time for questions,

people addressed Debbie as Anne.

Many tasty dishes were furnished by the Daughters and Friends, so everyone had their fill of sandwiches, cream puffs, fruits, vegetables and desserts. Carolyn Blount and Ada Evans of the Fiske Board served the coffee and tea. After the presentation by Debbie, co-chairs Kathy Dettmar and Mary Peters presented the door prizes and guests were invited to view the museum on the upper floor, and the Fiske library on the lower floor.

The weather cooperated with bright sunshine and the day was most enjoyable for all. The co-chairmen are to be congratulated, as over \$400 was raised for each organization on a delightful afternoon.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE WORKING ON STACKS

Last winter President Gary Zimmerman appointed a library committee to pursue extensive review of our shelves. The members are Jan Olson, who is a professional librarian, Mary Stoebuck, a long-time Fiske supporter, and Mary Peters, who does the cataloging. This group has been meeting regularly the past few months. Among their goals are the removal of out-of-date material, and a better labeling of books to help identify those which should not be checked out of the library, and also those which should not be laid flat for photocopying.

They are presently considering the possibility of relocating some of the reference books (which is the area in which they have been working) and placing them in a more accessible area. An example of this would be moving the "Search for Missing Friends" series from the immigration area to the Irish section, since it only concerns Irish immigrants. You will be kept informed of any changes as they occur.
